

GAME HISTORY

Saturday, October 23, 2010

Stephen F. Austin – 31, Sam Houston State – 28

The first Battle of the Piney Woods at Reliant Stadium was an exciting, back and forth affair in front of 24,685 fans, a new record audience for the matchup between the longtime rivals.

SFA opened the scoring with two touchdown throws from Jeremy Moses, racing out to a 14-0 lead. Sam Houston answered back in the 2nd quarter, scoring on touchdown runs from Richard Sincere and Tim Flanders to even the score.

The seesaw affair continued as Moses accounted for the next two touchdowns. After another Flanders rushing touchdown, the Bearkats were back within a score; however, SFA added a field goal, and a late touchdown by the Bearkats wasn't enough to stop the Lumberjacks from taking home the win.

Saturday, October 8, 2011

Sam Houston State – 45, Stephen F. Austin – 10

In the second year at Reliant Stadium, SFA opened up the scoring with a field goal. However, it was all Sam Houston the rest of the way, as the Bearkats scored 45 straight points before giving up a late touchdown.

Sam Houston running backs Tim Flanders and Richard Sincere each totaled two touchdowns, while quarterback Brian Bell was an efficient 16 for 23 for 214 yards and two touchdowns. A record 25,083 fans watched the Bearkats' win.

Saturday, October 6, 2012

Sam Houston State – 51, Stephen F. Austin – 43

The Bearkats struck first with a field goal, but SFA answered twice to take a 14-3 lead. From that point on Sam Houston took control, outscoring the Lumberjacks 48-14 til midway through the 4th quarter.



Lumberjacks quarterback Brady Attaway torched the Bearkats for six touchdowns in a losing effort, with star wide receiver Cordell Roberson accounting for 199 yards and three of those touchdowns. The Bearkats rumbled for 228 yards and two touchdowns in the win.

Saturday, November 2, 2013

Sam Houston State – 56, Stephen F. Austin – 49

The offenses lit up Reliant Stadium for the 3rd year in a row, as the teams combined for 63 points in the 4th quarter before the Lumberjacks' furious comeback ultimately fell short.

The teams traded scores and no team held more than a seven point lead, finally finishing the 3rd quarter tied at 28.

The game was sealed when the Bearkats recovered SFA's ensuing onside kick attempt, ending the wildest Battle of the Piney Woods in Houston yet in front of a record crowd of 26,213.



GAME HISTORY

Saturday, November 1, 2014

Sam Houston State – 42, Stephen F. Austin – 28

The Bearkats opened the scoring with a 59-yard touch-down rush by Keshawn Hill, which was answered by a defensive score from the Lumberjacks as Trey Vallier pounced on a fumble in the endzone.

Sam Houston used a pair of quick strikes in the third quarter to take control, extending its lead to 35-14 off Hill's fourth rushing touchdown and another from Johnson. SFA's Conque recorded one of his two touchdown rushes to pull the Lumberjacks to within two score, but the Bearkats put the game out of reach in the fourth behind a 52-yard score.

Saturday, October 3, 2015

Sam Houston State – 34, Stephen F. Austin – 28

Gerald Thomas and Yedidiah Louis each returned third-quarter punts for a touchdown and Sam Houston State came back to beat Stephen F. Austin 34-28 in the 90th Battle of the Piney Woods.

Stephen F. Austin had a 14-3 lead at the break but Sam Houston outscored the Lumberjacks 21-7 in the third to lead 24-21 going into the final quarter.

SHSU's Luc Swimberghe added a 32-yard field goal with 6:34 remaining to seal the Bearkats fifth consecutive win in the Battle of the Piney Woods at NRG Stadium.

Saturday, October 1, 2016

Sam Houston State – 63, Stephen F. Austin – 28

Displaying a quick-strike offense, Sam Houston routed SFA 63-28 as K.C. Keeler collected his 200th win in 23 years as a college head coach.

There was little the Lumberjacks could do to slow down the Bearkats. The Bearkats won the Battle of the Piney Woods for a sixth straight year, before a crowd of 27,411.

Saturday, October 7, 2017

Sam Houston State – 27, Stephen F. Austin – 16

In the 92nd edition of the Battle of the Piney Woods, the Stephen F. Austin football team left all it had on the field

but was unable to upend 11th-ranked Sam Houston State Saturday afternoon inside NRG Stadium in Houston, falling by a score of 27-16.

Despite forcing three turnovers, collecting an onside kick and seeing the Bearkats commit 13 penalties for 144 yards, SFA were outgained 508 to 219 in total offensive yards.

Saturday, October 6, 2018

Sam Houston State – 54, Stephen F. Austin 21

Sam Houston State got going early, scoring three touchdowns in the first quarter and never let off the gas, routing Stephen F. Austin 54-21. The Bearkats offensive showcase put up 500 total yards in the game, led by QB Ty Brock, who finished the game with 217 passing yards, two passing touchdowns with only one interception, as well as 46 rushing yards and one rushing touchdown. Lumberjacks RB Thomas Hutchings stood out, rushing for 89 yards on only seven carries (12.7 avg.), but it wasn't enough to keep up with Sam Houston State. Lumberjacks QB Foster Sawyer completed 15-of-28 passes for 106 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions in the contest.

Saturday, October 5, 2019

Sam Houston State – 31, Stephen F. Austin 20

Sam Houston State scored 17 fourth-quarter points to rally to beat Stephen F. Austin 31-20 in a game that featured nine turnovers. It was the Bearkats' ninth straight win in the "Battle of the Piney Woods."

The Lumberjacks led 10-0 after Josh McGowen's 2-yard TD run and Storm Ruiz's 30-yard field goal. Donovan Williams scored on a 1-yard run and Noah Smith's 32-yard TD pass to Ife Adeyi put the Bearkats up 14-10 by halftime.

In the second half, the teams traded field goals before Jones' pick-six gave the Lumberjacks a 20-17 lead. Then Ty Brock threw a 45-yard TD pass to Nathan Stewart for the go-ahead score with 6:28 left to play. Royce See recovered a fumble forced by Joseph Walker's sack of Trae Self on the Lumberjacks' next possession and Williams scored six plays later for the insurance TD.

STEPHEN F. AUSTIN STATE



Like the majestic pines that surround its campus, Stephen F. Austin State University has grown to a strong, independent institution standing proudly among its peers. Founded in 1923, SFA enrolls just under 13,000 students on a spectacularly beautiful 422-acre campus in Nacogdoches, the official Garden Capital of Texas.

SFA provides the academic breadth of a state university with the personalized attention often found at private schools. With a student-to-faculty ratio of 18-to-1 and an average class size of 25, SFA is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and consistently ranked a Tier 1 Regional University by U.S. News and World Report. Smaller classes combined with hands-on study, internships and research opportunities give students valuable experiences that translate to their chosen career paths.

The university offers more than 120 areas of study and 40 master's degree programs, as well as doctoral programs

in education, forestry and school psychology. From athletic training and communication disorders to mass media and banking, new and updated facilities provide students with the opportunity to apply their knowledge in a supervised setting while gaining real-world experience.

The Cole STEM Building, the university's newest facility, furthers SFA's mission of providing students with transformational learning experiences with its 100,000 square feet dedicated to science, technology, engineering and mathematics education. The building's focal point is a 52-foot diameter planetarium that seats 119. It also houses six research labs, a cybersecurity lab, digital media center, machine shop, maker spaces, four classrooms and a STEM computer lab.

SFA's DeWitt School of Nursing prepares future nurses by training them in an atmosphere that mimics real hospital and clinical settings.

The facility houses a mock hospital emergency room, pediatric unit and neonatal intensive care unit.

Additionally, SFA students can learn and prepare for their careers through educational opportunities with the Cole Art Center at the Old Opera House in historic downtown Nacogdoches and the Mast Student Investment Roundtable, where faculty members work with students to invest approximately \$650,000 in the stock market. And SFA boasts one of only two state-accredited university forestry programs in Texas — the only one actually located in a forest!

Named for the Father of Texas and located in the first town in the state, it should come as no surprise that SFA has a rich collection of university traditions. Service to their community might be SFA students' most-noted tradition. Lumberjacks are consistently recognized nationally on the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll.

DR. SCOTT GORDON

PRESIDENT



Dr. Scott Gordon has served as President of Stephen F. Austin State University since 2019, and has ushered in a series of new policies and procedures as SFA looks to embrace the changing nature of the college model.

A native of Malone, New York, Gordon received his bachelor's degree in biology from the State University of New York at Cortland. He earned a master's degree and doctorate in botany and mycology from the University of Tennessee in Knoxville and holds certifications from the Harvard University Graduate School of Education in educational management and leadership.

As EWU provost, Gordon was the university's chief academic officer, overseeing more than 500 faculty members in six academic colleges, with responsibility for academic policy and planning, distance education, international programs and institutional research.

Gordon led a complete reorganization of EWU's Academic Affairs unit, led the development and implementation of the university's strategic plan in 2018 and developed partnerships with community colleges, business and industry, as well as government entities. This work was



highlighted by a unique partnership with Microsoft and the collaboration with multiple businesses on The Catalyst, a 140,000-square-foot facility in downtown Spokane.

Prior to joining Eastern Washington, Gordon spent 22 years at the University of Southern Indiana, where he served as dean of the Pott College of Science, Engineering and Education. In addition, Gordon served for 10 years as the Faculty Athletics Representative, was named a NCAA Faculty Athletic Representative Fellow, and was vice president and treasurer of the Great Lakes Valley Conference, which includes 14 NCAA Division II institutions.

"I am deeply committed to the vision, mission and goals of SFA and believe my background and values are a great fit with the institution," he said. "I look forward to joining the SFA family."

RYAN IVEY

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Upon being named Stephen F. Austin State University's Director of Athletics on July 1, 2018, Ryan Ivey wasted no time in setting the ultimate goal for the department: to become the best mid-major NCAA Division I athletic program in the nation. If his body of work in college athletic administration over the last decade is any indication, then Ivey certainly has the tools necessary to begin accomplishing that goal.

Ivey's trajectory as one of the nation's best and brightest college athletic administrators continued to move in an upward direction during his three-year tenure as the director of athletics at Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tenn. With Ivey at the helm, the Governors increased their national profile across both the NCAA Division I athletics landscape and within the Ohio Valley Conference by posting a number of impressive winning seasons and announcing numerous major coaching hires. On the fundraising side, Ivey helped raise \$6.5 million in gifts which were funneled into facility improvements and the athletics department budget.

In addition to Ivey's strong background in fundraising, he helped to create a culture of winning, most notably in football. Right after the Governors posted one of the worst records in the country in 2015, Ivey brought aboard Will Healy to right the ship. It took just two seasons for Healy — the eventual 2017 OVC Coach of the Year — to orchestrate one of the biggest comebacks in Division I football as he led the Governors to a program-record eight wins, a total which had last been reached in 1977. Healy, collected the 2017 STATS LLC Eddie Robinson Award as the top NCAA Division I FCS football coach in the nation for his exemplary efforts.

The 2017-18 academic year featured a number of other impressive benchmarks for Austin Peay as a program-record 10 student-athletes were named to the 2018 Arthur Ashe Jr. Sport Scholar

teams. Women's tennis student-athlete Linda Yanes Garcia was one of 20 semifinalists, accorded to the most decorated of the more than 1,000 outstanding minority student-athletes nominated by their respective colleges or universities. Four APSU teams received NCAA Public Recognition Awards — women's golf, women's volleyball, women's cross country and women's tennis.

The Governors also posted their best finish ever in the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) Commissioner's Cup standings by racking up 101.5 points to post a fifth-place finish in the 12-team league.

It was his impressive body of work at Division II institution Texas A&M-Commerce, however, which led Ivey back to the Division I ranks in 2015. The Kentucky native orchestrated one of the biggest turnarounds in Division II during his two-year stint with the Lions. Upon arriving in Commerce in January of 2013, Ivey took the reins of an athletic program that faced a disenchanted base of fans and alumni who had witnessed years of losing seasons in a number of key sports. Ivey quickly made a series of strategic hires, and he issued a mandate that coaches were not only expected to win, but to mold their players into responsible students and respectful community citizens as well. In addition to the six conference championships won in 2015, the Lions had two National Players of the Year, 35 All-Americans, 11 Lone Star Players of the Year, 11 National All-Academic athletes and a State Coach of the Year.

He spearheaded drives that resulted in more than \$2.8 million in facility improvements, including a \$1.4 million softball field that saw a first-year program in 2015 finish with a winning record. Ivey also helped raise the program profile in the community. He created athletics town hall meetings at nine different sites that provided opportunities for fans to provide feedback.

Ivey spent six years at McNeese in Lake Charles, La., before his tenure at Texas A&M-Commerce. Arriving in July 2007 as assistant athletic director for internal affairs, Ivey focused on growing corporate sponsorship revenue. He was promoted to associate director in 2010 where he continued his work in revenue generation while overseeing operations for all of the institution's athletic programs.

Prior to breaking into athletic administration, Ivey served as the director of basketball operations for the Memphis women's basketball team from 2005-07 which followed a short stint as an athletics marketing coordinator at the University of South Dakota. After his graduation from Memphis in 2004, Ivey secured a position with the Memphis Redbirds — the triple-A affiliate of the St. Louis Cardinals — as a stadium operations assistant.

A student-athlete at Memphis, Ivey suited up for the Tigers and holder. Ivey held for Lou Groza finalist and eventual two-time Super Bowl champion Stephen Gostkowski. Ivey earned both his bachelor's (sports management, 2004) and master's (sports and leisure commerce, 2010) from Memphis as well.

Ivey is married to the former Kelley Holt from Fayetteville, Tenn. The couple has two sons, Jett and Ace.

COLBY CARTHEL

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH



Colby Carthel begins his third year at the helm of SFA in 2021, having already made great strides in recruiting as well as the on-field product. Carthel will guide SFA through its first season in the Western Athletic Conference, as well as the one and only season taking part in the AQ7 Challenge to determine postseason berths.

The Lumberjack football program got back to its winning ways in the 2020 season, Carthel's second in Nacogdoches. The 'Jacks finished the fall slate with a 6-4 record, SFA's first winning season since 2011. The 'Jacks played four FBS opponents and played well in each game, while winning all games against FCS competition on the season. SFA placed nine players on Southland All-Conference teams in the program's last season as part of the conference.

In Carthel's first season in Nacogdoches, the 'Jacks improved their win total by a game and had three athletes garner a total of four Southland All-Conference honors. Placekicker Storm Ruiz finished his superb career as a First Team All-Conference honoree, while Xavier Gipson and Willie Roberts, both freshmen, were named to All-Conference Third Team honors. Gipson also earned a place on the Third Team All-Conference Defensive Team as a kick returner.

ABOUT NRG STADIUM

NRG Stadium is home to both the Houston Texans and Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. It was also the home of Houston's third Super Bowl, Super Bowl LI. The stadium also has played host to the Texas Bowl, the Battle of the Piney Woods and the 2019 Texas Kickoff.

The Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo continues to play to a packed house year after year, boasting such acts as Keith Urban, Rascal Flatts, Jonas Brothers, ZZ Top, Pat Green, Brooks & Dunn and Taylor Swift. NRG Stadium also has played host to The Rolling Stones, U2, Metallica, Kenny Chesney, WrestleMania XXV, Disney on Ice and the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus.

Ground broke on NRG Stadium on March 9, 2000. The stadium, covering 1.9 million square feet, features 44,000 seats on the sideline. There are 8,200 club seats and 187 suites.

With the innovation of the retractable roof, Houston returned to outdoor NFL action in 2002 for the first time since Super Bowl VIII at Rice Stadium in 1974. The roof is made of translucent, Teflon-coated fiberglass fabric, and takes 10 minutes to open and close. When it opens, the roof splits at the 50-yard line and docks in the end zones.



NRG Stadium also boasts a larger-than-life scoreboard. Following the trend that was started with the Astrodome scoreboard, NRG Stadium houses two of the largest video boards in the league. Both include out-of-town scores, down and distance, the game clock and a host of other traits.

Across the street, the Methodist Training Center features three grass practice fields. One field is lit for night sessions during training camp. The Texans also have an indoor practice field outfitted with FieldTurf. The air-supported structure offers the team a seamless transition from outdoor to indoor practice in case of inclement weather. The state-of-the-art facility also doubles as the team's training camp headquarters.

Sam Houston is an NCAA Division I athletic department that sponsors 17 sports and currently competes in the Western Athletic Conference. SHSU first competed in intercollegiate athletics in 1906 and has been a Division I athletic department since 1987.

Sam Houston claimed its first NCAA Division I national championship when the bowling team defeated Nebraska, and reached the pinnacle of FCS football in 2020 by claiming the national crown with a 23-21 win over South Dakota State.

Since 2000, the department has enjoyed success, winning 55 league titles while also earning the Southland Conference Commissioners Cup, awarded to the top overall performing athletic department. Bearkat Athletics holds the league record of seven Cup titles. Before moving to the Western Athletic Conference for the 2021-22 season, the football team advanced to the FCS playoffs nine times, including four semifinals, and played for the FCS national championship in 2011 and 2012 before winning the 2020 title.

The men's basketball program has twice played in the NCAA Tournament (2003, 2010) and one NIT (2019). The baseball program has played

in eight Regionals and in 2017, was the first Southland Conference school to advance to the Super Regionals.

Named for Texas's greatest hero, Sam Houston State University (SHSU) continually honors its historical roots through academic excellence. For more than 140 years, SHSU has been preparing students for meaningful lives of achievement. Its motto, "The measure of a Life is its Service," resonates among its 22,000 students, eight colleges and well beyond its Huntsville roots.

Sam Houston State offers top-ranked degree programs and was named No. 3 among the '2020 Best Valued Online Colleges.' With over 90 bachelor degrees, 50 master's, and 11 doctoral programs—including the nation's first Ph.D. in forensic science, SHSU provides an exceptional college experience for every student: traditional or non-traditional; first generation; international; or online.

In the fall of 2020, SHSU welcomed its inaugural class of student doctors into the College of Osteopathic Medicine, the third college of osteopathic medicine in Texas. Its mission is to train physicians who will serve the healthcare needs of rural and underserved Texans.

Service to self and others is paramount at SHSU and reflected in all university organizations and programs. In fact, the university was named to USA Today's Top 50 in the U.S. for "commitment to civic engagement and global awareness," in addition to being classified a "Community Engaged Campus" by the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education. This honor, bestowed to only 311 public institutions nationwide, acknowledges the university's significant commitment to service.

At SHSU, the student-athlete experience is defined by Bearkat Athletics, with 17 teams competing at the NCAA Division I level in the Western Athletic Conference. Dr. White earned a Ph.D. in Mass Communication and an M.S.L.S. degree from the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, and a B.A. in Business from Lee College (now Lee University) in Cleveland, Tennessee. In addition to her experience in Tennessee and Texas, she has held faculty and leadership positions in Alaska, Louisiana, and Georgia.

Dr. Alisa White is the 14th president of Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas. She began her tenure with the university on Aug. 10, 2020.

BOBBY WILLIAMS

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Williams has received the General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award from the All-American Football Foundation and the AstroTurf Athletics Director of the Year “Football Championship Subdivision West Region” award.

Williams has overseen an amazing make-over of Sam Houston’s intercollegiate sports facilities including state-of-the-art video/scoreboards at four venues; new artificial turf fields for football, soccer and baseball and renovation of Bernard G. Johnson Coliseum.

Facility additions have included the Ron Randleman Strength and Fitness Center, Don Sanders Stadium (baseball), Bearkat Softball Stadium and the McIver Golf Training Facility and the Robert and Erin Steele Golf Facility at Raven’s Nest Golf Course.

In 2019, the Woodforest Bank Athletic Center opened its doors, including the Learning Enhancement Center and the Bearkat Sports Network studios. The BSN media suite includes a 500 square foot television studio, a podcast center and two control rooms, one of which serves as a centralized ESPN production room for events at Bowers Stadium, Pritchett Field, Don Sanders Stadium and the Bearkat Softball Complex.

With new marketing strategies, Williams and his staff have increased both campus and community attendance at all Bearkat intercollegiate athletics events and increased revenue generated from outside university sources. In addition, Sam Houston athletics has received regional and national television exposure through telecasts on the ESPN family of networks and other outlets.

Williams was a starter at wide receiver for the Rice Owls. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from Rice University in 1981 and his Master of Arts from Rice a year later.

His father, the late Bobby Williams, Sr., was a member of Rice University’s 1958 Cotton Bowl team and retired in 2002 after working as an NFL scout for the Buffalo Bills and Miami Dolphins. His mother, Carolyn, retired from the Dow Chemical Company.

His wife, Janet, received her Bachelor’s degree and her Master’s degree from Sam Houston as have her father General Thomas Stone (distinguished alumni 1999 and football letterman 1955-56), mother Claudette, brother Keith (football letterman 1978-79) and sister Kelly (Master’s degree). Janet is a professor in the SHSU College of Education. The pair have two daughters, Audrey Kathryn and Alexandra Karolyn (both Sam Houston graduates).

In 23 seasons as director of athletics at Sam Houston, Bobby Williams has led the Bearkats to unprecedented competitive success while simultaneously lifting the academic performance of the university’s 17 sports programs.

Williams has served Sam Houston as an athletic administrator and a coach since 1982. He was interim director of athletics for the 1997-98 school year after working as assistant director of athletics for seven years. He was an assistant football coach for nine years.

Sam Houston won the Southland Conference Commissioner’s Cup a league record seven times. The Bearkats won their first cup in 2005, sharing the honor with Texas State. They then won the title in 2006 and 2007 to become the first school to win three straight. The Bearkats then claimed back-to-back titles in 2013 and 2014 and won their sixth in 2018 to move past SFA for most in Southland and then the seventh in 2019 after winning nine championships in the spring semester.

Under his direction, the Bearkats have won two NCAA Division I national championships, climbing the bowling title in 2014 and then football in the spring of 2021.





K.C. KEELER HEAD COACH

Now in his 28th year as a head coach, K.C. Keeler has taken the Bearkats to places they have never been before, culminating in the program's first-ever FCS national championship in 2020. In his tenure he has directed the Bearkats to a 72-22 record that includes 14 victories over top-10 ranked opponents and 13 wins in NCAA postseason action.

In his career, Keeler has produced a record of 246 victories, only 95 losses and 1 tie. His teams at Rowan, Delaware and Sam Houston have combined for 16 NCAA postseason playoff appearances, 10 conference championships and played in 9 national championship games.

His SHSU teams made the playoffs in each of his first 4 seasons at the helm, including FCS semifinals appearances in 2014, 2015 and 2017 along with a pair of Southland Conference championships. But it was the 2020 season that catapulted the Bearkats, and Keeler, even higher into the upper echelon of FCS programs.

Keeler helped direct the Bearkats through the COVID-19 pandemic that pushed the season back to the Spring 2021 semester, and then helped Sam Houston close out a perfect 10-0 record with the program's first-ever title at the FCS level.

After a win over Monmouth in the opening round, Sam Houston knocked off North Dakota State and James Madison, winners of the last 9 FCS titles, to reach Frisco and the title game. The Kats then took down top-seeded South Dakota State to claim the title. With the win, Keeler became the first coach in FCS history to win FCS championships at multiple institutions, having also won the 2003 title at Delaware. He also passed Jim Tressell for the most FCS playoff wins in the division's history with 25.

In 2016 he led the Bearkats to their second conference title in three seasons and a national No. 1 ranking for the final six weeks of the regular season on their way to being the nation's lone unbeaten team entering the FCS playoffs. That run helped him become the first Bearkat coach to claim the Eddie Robinson Award as the top head coach in the FCS in a season that also saw Sam Houston's quarterback, Jeremiah Briscoe, earn the Walter Payton Award as the nation's top offensive player.

Keeler was named Sam Houston's 15th head football coach on January 23, 2014. He has coached nine National Football League draft picks including Super Bowl XLVII MVP quarterback Joe Flacco and 2018 second-round pick PJ Hall. He has tutored 77 All-America players and 22 student-athletes who have earned either national or district CoSIDA Academic All-America honors.

As head coach at Delaware, Keeler rolled up an 86-52 record in 11 seasons from 2002 to 2012. His Fightin' Blue Hens won the FCS national championship in 2003 and reached the national championship game in 2007 and 2010. His squads won Atlantic



10 Conference titles in 2003 and 2004 and the Colonial Athletic Association championship in 2010. Delaware went 11-3 in the program's four trips to the FCS playoffs.

At Rowan in Glassboro, N.J., Keeler produced an 88-21-1 record from 1993 to 2001 that included seven NCAA Division III playoff appearances including five trips to the National Championship game. His teams posted a 21-7 record in NCAA Division III playoff action. Among Keeler's coaching honors are selections as AFCA FCS National Coach of the Year, Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year, Maxwell Club Tri-State Coach of the Year and the All-America Football Foundation Johnny Vaught Head Coach Award.

Keeler began his coaching career as an assistant at Amherst College in Massachusetts in 1981, then moved to Rowan in 1986. He was named head coach at Rowan in 1993. The Profs won four New Jersey Athletic Conference championships and finished as runner-up in the league twice in Keeler's nine seasons.

Keeler was a 4-sport letterman at Emmaus, Pa., High School. He earned all-league honors and was football team captain as a tight end and linebacker. He played linebacker for head coach Tubby Raymond at Delaware from 1978 to 1980, helping lead the Blue Hens to the 1979 NCAA Division II national championship. In 1980, he signed a free agent contract with the Philadelphia Eagles, also doing so in 1982 and 1983.

Kurt Charles "K.C." Keeler was born July 26, 1959, in Emmaus, Pa. He and his wife Janice are the parents of daughter Kate and son Jackson.
